I. University Course Catalog Description

An intensive study of the contrapuntal practice of the 18th century; development of skills in perceiving and writing music the style of the period through the use of aural and visual analysis.

II. Course Prerequisites

III. Course Objectives

We will explore the rich musical language of Johann Sebastian Bach, as exemplified by his two- and three-voice compositions with an emphasis on the two-voice inventions and three-voice fugues. By listening to representative examples and analyzing them, we will recreate the style of J.S. Bach through composition. Students will gain a better understanding of eighteen-century composition, along with its contrapuntal textures and genres, as evidenced by regular assignments and composition projects. The course culminates with the composition of either a complete two-part invention or a three-part fugue in the style of J.S. Bach.

IV. Student Learning Outcomes (SLO's)

Students will able to: Define & recognize structural characteristics of 18th century contrapuntal styles of J.S. Bach

Compose short passages of counterpoint in a variety of styles including chorales, 2-3 part inventions, invertible counterpoint, canons, and 3-4 voice fugues.

Analyze score passages in Bach's *Goldberg Variations* (BWV 988) and cogently present/lecture on their findings to the rest of the class.

Description of Letter Grades

100-90% - truly excellent work that shows a high degree of mastery of the subject. Very close to error-free and displays strong musical instincts and creativity.

89-80% - work that shows a solid command of the material, but contains a few errors without any major conceptual confusions.

79-70% - work that exhibits a mixture of understanding and misunderstanding, and the misunderstanding is of a comparatively deep and problematic nature.

69-60% - work reflecting a thorough/on-going failure to grasp the material.

< 60% - unacceptably poor and/or incomplete work.

Graded tests and materials in this course will be returned individually *only by request*. You can access your scores at any time using the 'Grade' function of Canvas. Please note that scores posted to Canvas are unofficial and may not reflect the proper weighting of each section of your final grade. Additionally, they must be received by 12:00pm on the day they are assigned.*

Late Work Policy: Weekly assignments are due at the start of the class they are assigned (9:30am). Late Assignments will be accepted for grade with the following deductions:

<u>Consequences:</u> All students involved fail the course and potentially face further academic sanctions at the discretion of
